

## LA GREENWAY - LOS ANGELES, CA <sup>4</sup>

- × Creation of a continuous 51-mile greenway and urban open space adjacent to the LA River.
- × 26-miles are already completed and new projects are underway.
- × The "Alternative 20 Plan" for the river corridor includes: A \$1.08 billion plan to restore 719 acres, tear out 3 miles of concrete, and provide terracing on the eastern banks.
- × Estimated to attract more than \$5 billion in investment



## SOUTH PLATTE RIVER - DENVER, CO <sup>5</sup>

- × Denver currently has \$24.5 million worth of improvement projects underway on the river.
- × Estimates hold that the city has seen a \$10 billion return on the existing \$100 million investment into environmental and recreational improvements on the river.
- × The South Platte also represents one of the biggest economic opportunities for the city, according to Mayor Michael Hancock, with the riverfront poised for a boom on both the north and south sides of town.



## VARIOUS TRAIL SYSTEMS - MINNESOTA <sup>6</sup>

- × During warm weather months in Minnesota, nearly 1.5 million cyclists, inline skaters, and walkers use our nationally-recognized city, county, and state trails.
- × Statewide trail spending of \$2.4 million was estimated to produce \$2.9 million in gross output. This contributed \$1.5 million to gross state product (GSP).
- × 30,900 full-time and part-time jobs were supported by trail spending in various regions.
- × Employee compensation from these jobs reached \$864 million.
- × Out-of-state visitors contributed \$439 million in trail-related spending, equivalent to 20 percent of total trail spending.

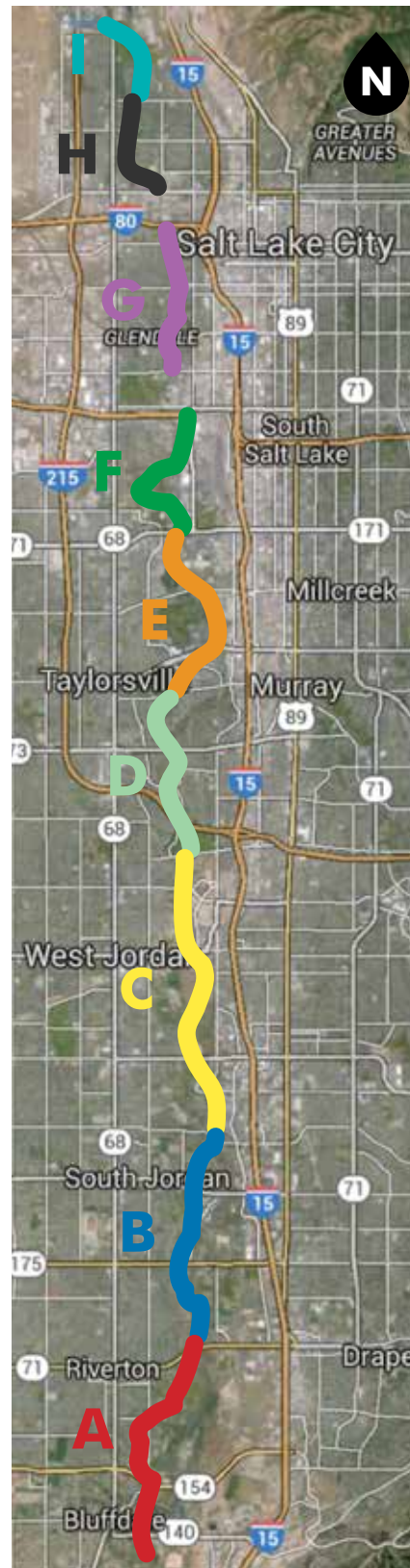

## BOISE RIVER - GREENBELT, ID<sup>1</sup>

- × The Boise River was once the second most polluted river in Idaho.
- × Today it receives 300,000 people annually making it the most heavily recreated river in Idaho.
- × The river contributes to the quality of life of the region that attracts new businesses and industries each year.



## LOWER ANIMAS RIVER - DURANGO, CO<sup>2</sup>

- × A destination for whitewater kayaking and rafting due to rapids (opportunity for artificial rapids on the Jordan River).
- × Stimulates \$19,397,633 yearly through restaurant, lodging, and equipment rental and sales.
- × Total whitewater recreation employment on river estimated at 536 PTE (268 FTE).



## RIVERWALK - SAN ANTONIO, TX<sup>3</sup>

- × 11.5 million people visit the River Walk annually - 9.3 million of these people are non-residents with the main reason for their visit being the River Walk.
- × The Riverwalk stimulates \$3.1 billion yearly and directly and indirectly influences 31,000 jobs.



- × The Riverwalk's new Mission Reach section created an 8 mile restoration area of aquatic and riparian woodland habitats.
- × These jobs support \$1 billion in income and benefits. This results in \$173 million of revenue to state and local governmental agencies and \$201 million to the federal government.
- × The project includes 15 miles of hiking and biking trails and numerous other amenities.
